

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What shall we do with £18,000?

This year, the Parish Council has received just over £18,000 in Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) income from Huntingdon District Council – the first time CIL money has been received by our Parish.

The Parish Council must now plan what we will spend this money on and we need your input. How should we spend the money?

The Parish Council is legally answerable to Huntingdon District Council for our use of the money and there are legal constraints on exactly what we can use it for. In general terms, we can use the money to support the development of our parish by paying for new infrastructure, replacing, operating or maintaining existing infrastructure or doing anything else that we can show helps address the demands that development is placing on our parish.

In this context, 'infrastructure' can include:

Roads and transport facilities Schools and other educational facilities Health facilities Sports and recreational facilities Green, open spaces and facilities Social and community facilities Economic regeneration Emergency services Utilities Flood defences

In every case, the CIL money must be used to improve, operate, maintain, or add to our existing infrastructure and cannot be used to add to the specific development that generated the CIL money, which is almost exclusively from Alconbury Weald in our case.

So, tell us what we should spend the money on. Ultimately, whatever we decide as a community must be realistic and achievable (even £18,000 is not a great deal of money in infrastructure terms), but the development at Alconbury Weald is likely to generate considerable and regular sums of CIL money over the next few years and we should all think carefully about how we can best use this windfall to support our community, especially in managing the changes taking place as a result of the developments.

It is only by giving the Parish Council your views and suggestions that we will be certain of making the best use of this new money. Please tell us what you suggest we do with it.



Initial Consultation

Our area faces many challenges, from developments and changes proposed both within and adjacent to our Parish boundaries. A Neighbourhood Plan would give our local community much greater control over the way in which our area develops as it would have the same status in planning law as those plans made by the District Council in its Local Plan.

The Stukeleys Parish Council has already registered to create a plan and we are now at stage 2 of the process where we need to gather more information from you to help shape the Neighbourhood Plan. A Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group has now been established comprising members of the Parish Council and volunteers from the local community.

People do not generally like having things imposed on them; therefore, our Neighbourhood Plan must be a genuine community document and we are seeking to involve the wider community, including those who work in the area as well as residents.

The Group is undertaking an initial consultation with local residents, businesses, landowners and other stakeholders to establish the main issues. To achieve this, 3 drop-in sessions have been arranged as follows:

The aim of these drop-in sessions is to receive your views on issues such as:

Transport Includes roads, traffic, cycling, walking and public transport issues. Effects of major local developments that are, or may take place, within or adjacent to the Parish Provision of public services Landscape Heritage Environment Residential provision Community Retail provision Employment

The drop-in sessions will provide you with the opportunity to view a map of our Parish and to make comments on the issues above, which isn't an exhaustive list and we would welcome your thoughts on other planning issues should you have them. We will use the information we collate to begin the production of the formal Neighbourhood Plan, which, rest assured, will be subject to further scrutiny from you as parishioners and other formal processes before it is submitted for approval. Our views will have legal weight, but the District Council would remain the authority in control of planning

To ensure our Neighbourhood Plan is inclusive we would very much welcome your participation in one or more of the 3 drop-in sessions mentioned above.

THIS COUNTRY CALLED ENGLAND: INCLUDES A Thames Cruise between WINDSOR and RUNNYMEDE *Thursday 18th May 2017*

THE MAGNA CARTA: In 1215 the Barons of England in conflict with King John forced him to concede to their complaints. On the 15th June 1215, after nine days of talks, the MAGNA CARTA was agreed at Runnymede. It remains the *NEAREST THING* to a BILL OF RIGHTS that Britain has ever had. The MAGNA CARTA with its ideals of democracy, limitations of power, equality and freedom under the law forms the basis of the Constitutions of many other countries including the USA.

The King and his followers were encamped on the north shore at Wraysbury while the Barons and their great retinue occupied the meadows of Runnymede just across the Thames. There is no doubt that *Runingmed* or *Ronimed* was the actual meadow which served as an encampment for the nobles and their force at the signing of the MAGNA CARTA. However, no record exists of the exact spot where the signing took place. The MAGNA CARTA itself gives no clue other than" *Ronimed, inter Windlesoram et Stanes"* (*RUNNYMEDE situated between Windsor and Staines*).

As part of our THIS COUNTRY CALLED ENGLAND trip we will have an opportunity to visit this meadow which will entail a short walk across the fields on the flat.

Oi, that's my boozer!

Much has been said in the parish magazine by 'Mr Pernickety' over the last few months about The Stukeleys Country Hotel and his views on the quality of the décor, food and drink.

Well, it's time someone unconnected with the hotel made a response. As it's my preferred place for a quiet drink, I'll do it. These views are mine – I have not been asked by the hotel to make these comments and neither has the parish council had any input.

Very often in life, what we get is what we expect to get. So, the key question is – what do I expect to get when I visit the Stukeleys Country Hotel? Simple really – good company, good beer and, if I turn up hungry, good pub grub. Clearly very different to what Mr Pernickety expects.

By coincidence, Michelle and I turned up hungry early evening on Monday 6 March. By sheer luck, it was the first day of national pie week and the Stukeleys was offering a good selection of home-made pies. While we considered our pie options, I had a bottle of London Pride from the fridge, which was excellent as you'd expect, and Michelle had a gin and tonic. Claire and Andrea behind the bar both knowing us well enough to make the right choices without asking.

The company, as ever, was warm and welcoming with around twelve or fourteen people in the bar and the seated area. The Stukeleys is one of the very few bars I know where the local crowd is so welcoming not just of the regulars, but of infrequent visitors and total strangers – a character I know is especially appreciated by the steady stream of visitors from USAF Alconbury.

The pie, when it arrived around ten minutes after we ordered it, was fantastic – we both opted for the steak pie with a stilton sauce – with large, well-cooked bits of steak, rich gravy and pastry that was obviously homemade and very good. A credit to Diana's cooking skills. My mash, peas and extra gravy made for a tasty and very filling dinner – pub food at its best and exactly what I expected. Michelle (herself something of an expert in homemade pies) was equally satisfied with her dinner.

Sadly, there was no time for dessert on Monday, but our regular experience is that desserts are very good with enough choice to suit everyone. Nor was there enough time for a second London Pride to keep the first one company, but I know that Claire keeps enough in the fridge that there'll always be one waiting for me when I get there again.

One of the important concerns for Michelle and me in moving back to this area a few years ago to be nearer to my mum, was that we had to have a good local pub, not having found one where we lived before.  - 1. I understand that when a patient is receiving NHS funded Health Care there is a NHS Continuing Healthcare assessment procedure to be followed.
 - 2. In February 2017, this procedure was deliberately bypassed for my wife Betty.
 - 3. Following my email of 25 Feb 2017 to the CEO Hinchingbrooke Hospital, 'Health At Home' now continue to provide care and NHS Continuing Healthcare assessment procedures for Betty are now in progress.
 - 4. I was unaware that my correspondence should have been addressed to the CEO CPFT and not the CEO Hinchingbrooke who kindly corrected me on this matter.
 - 5. This leads to the following questions:
 - a. Why did CPFT staff ignore repeated requests from CCC staff for NHS Continuing Healthcare assessments to be made on my wife Betty?
 - b. Why did CCC staff repeatedly request CPFT to carry out Continuing NHS Health Care assessments and then without such assessments proceed to transfer costs of Continuing NHS Health Care from the NHS to Betty plus an Agency fee of £75?
 - c. Could this be a widespread standard expediency practice in the CPFT and CCC to make savings and transfer costs to patients who cannot fend for themselves?

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
