

# Parish Councillor Vacancies

The District Council has informed the Parish Clerk that after the due period of notice required by section 87(2) of the Local Government Act 1972, no parishioners requested that an election for two Parish Councillors be called. Therefore, the Parish Council will now seek to co-opt two Parish Councillors at the Parish Council Meeting to be held on Monday 5<sup>th</sup> September, 2016. If there are more than two candidates for the vacancies, a vote will be taken by the Councillors at the Council Meeting. There is almost 2 years remaining for this Council's term of office before another election will be called.

Applications in writing should be made to the Parish Clerk by the closing date of Friday 19<sup>th</sup> August 2016 and applicants should state (i) why they wish to join the Parish Council and (ii) what they feel they would be able to contribute to the Parish Council.

# The Stukeleys Parish Council News

The Parish Meeting was held on the 4<sup>th</sup> July 2016 at Little Stukeley Village Hall.

A resident expressed his concerns about a planning application to be considered by the Parish Council that evening, the Chairman explained that the Council could only recommend refusal of a planning application, if there were material issues. The Council sympathised with the resident and would support the parishioner if any environmental conditions were not met.

The poor condition of the village grass cutting to be investigated and monitored by the Open Spaces and Environment working party, who are also working on a new specific tender for next year. County Councillor Sir Peter Brown to investigate complaints received regarding the state of the verge by the village side of the flyover near Low Road. The Parish Council continue to report highway and rights of way repair and maintenance issues to Cambridgeshire County Council.

The Parish Council have agreed to replace the existing lamps with 18 Watt LED lamps in all Parish Council's owned streetlights and for each unit to have an electrical test check.

The following planning applications were considered by the Parish Council:

i

9 Church Way, Little Stukeley– 16/01037/HHFUL – Replacement of existing detached garage & store with new double garage and store and construction of detached stables to rear of existing property.

After discussion and consideration of objections raised by neighbours. It was resolved to recommend approval as the application was entirely compatible with the surrounding conservation area and with no deleterious effects on neighbouring properties that could be considered material planning considerations.

Alconbury Weald, Ermine Street – 16/01148/REM – Submission of reserved matters

 (appearance, access, landscaping, layout and scale) in respect of the construction of strategic foul
 by potable water main, water pressure boost pump, foul water pumping station and pedestrian
 and cycleway including ground remodelling and ancillary works.

After considering a report from the planning group the Parish Council resolved to make the

After considering a report from the planning group the Parish Council resolved to make the following comments:

In terms of process and compliance with the outline it was considered that the application was sound.

In terms of infrastructure it was considered that the water mains were necessary and it was welcomed that this work was to be done in advance of KP2.

The provision of the footpath cycle way from Alconbury Weald to Huntingdon was an important piece of infrastructure as it provided an alternative route other than Ermine Street and it had long been The Stukeleys Parish Council's desire to provide an alternative. This was welcomed.

While the Council fully supported the provision of the work proposed and the use of the route as a cycleway and footpath, the Council was concerned that in encouraging use by these modes, the applicant had provided no details on how this route would integrate into the cycling and walking network for Huntingdon. More importantly, the Council were concerned that the proposal was not supported by any measures to introduce a controlled crossing where the existing route crossed the A141. The Council were aware of a similar situation less than a mile to the east when the Towerfield development was approved some years ago which included the relocation of the Jubilee Playing fields along Kings Ripton Road further out from town. No provision was made for pedestrians and cyclists to cross the A141 and some years later, a local teenager. Warren Hay, was killed when crossing at that location without the benefit of a controlled crossing facility. A controlled crossing was subsequently installed. The Council was concerned that given the level of potential usage that would arise as a result of providing this route from Alconbury Weald, that a similar situation might occur at this location given the lack of a controlled crossing and this Parish Council considered that the Local Planning Authority must take this into consideration before any resolution to grant planning permission is made. In relation to the design of the footpath /cycleway:

It was questioned if it was really necessary to restrict the width of the route to 2m through the ridge and furrow as materially this makes little difference in visual or archaeological terms. Consideration should be given to lighting the footpath / cycleway. Consideration be given to improving the final section of path to Spittals Way, A141.

iii 1 Low Road, Little Stukeley – 16/01062/LBC – Repair (or replacement where beyond repair) of sash windows to front elevation, including the upgrade of glazing to ultra-thin double glazing without change to window section profile. Replacement of ground floor casement windows and sills with new wooden double glassed windows without change to window style. Replacement of fixed windows on second floor including upgrade to double glazing. Repaint of house in matching finish and colour, with repair to plastee work as necessary.

After discussion it was resolved to recommend approval as he application was a sympathetic repair and upgrade of windows to current, more sustainable standards with minimal impact on the visual appearance of this historically important building.

iv 4 Beech Avenue, Great Stukeley- 16/01222/TREE - T1 Copper Beech: crown lift by 4 metres and reduce lower lateral limbs, T2 Copper Beech: crown lift by 4 metres and reduce lower lateral limbs.

After discussion it was resolved to recommend approval with reservations. The application would protect the house and outbuildings. These were important trees that make a substantial contribution to the visual amenity of the area. They significantly pre-date the buildings they were close to and are slow growing; any part of the tree that was removed will regrow only very slowly. The Council recommend varying the permission to remove the request to lift the crowns 'by 4 metres' and apply a condition to the permission such that the crown lift and reduction of lateral limbs is limited to only those parts of the trees that must be removed to give immediate relief to the buildings and that further lifting and reducing should not take place for any other reason, including but not limited to reduction of shading and the like.

22 Pringle Way, Little Stukeley– 16/01156/FUL – Erection of two detached dwellings and garage following the demolition of the existing house and garage.
After further discussion it was resolved to recommend approval as this was a sustainable development that enhances the conservation area and returns to use a site that was currently Derelict.

The Parish Council reviewed the Neighbourhood Steering Group's Terms of Reference and agreed that the next group meeting should be held in July.

The Stukeleys Parish Council now has two vacancies on the Parish Council. If you are interested in considering becoming a Parish Councillor and would like some more information about the role please speak to one of our Parish Councillors or the Parish Clerk.



#### **10K Run Trustee Dies**

It is with sadness that we note the passing of `Bex` (Rebecca Griffiths, 34, known as `Bex`). She was a detective sergeant with Cambridgeshire police who was diagnosed with bowel and liver cancer when she was still on maternity leave in August 2014.

She was a trustee of the Huntingdon 10K Charitable Trust.

She started this year's race on behalf of the trust when hundreds of people ran 10k from Alconbury Weald through Great Stukeley and back to raise money for various charities inclusive of HCCN (Huntingdon Community Cancer Network).

The Bex team was represented in the race by 50+ runners although sadly they did not win the team prize.

Two evenings a week, 'Team Bex' runs around the local roads. On Saturday mornings, they run around Hinchingbrooke Park. Most of them are first-time runners. When she could not run, Bex went with them on her bike to make sure they did their stretches.

Her tip for anyone who wants to start running was to run from one lamp post to the next, then jog to the next one, then run to the next one. Gradually, you increase the number of lampposts you can run. She taught her runners like that and now they can run five miles without stopping. She said: "They don't have to do this. It's great to see the smiles on their faces."

The barmaid was constantly absent from the bar as many prospective clients found out and many walked away.

As to the beers it's suffice to say they were left on the table; sour tasting and one was cloudy. Again no apologies, a "like it or leave it" attitude.

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
