The Stukeleys Parish Council Report

Stukeleys Working Group Meeting held on Monday 5th July 2021 at 7.15pm at Little Stukeley Village Hall:

Those present Chairman Terry Pinner, Tim Close, Sally Smith, Glyn Evans, Paula Tuck. Apologies received from Ben Parkyn, Shaun Burton, Louise Smith.

Cllr. Cull offered his resignation from the council for personal reasons, the council thanked him and wished him well, Council to place notice of a vacancy in the village notice boards and parish magazine.

The clerk also offered her resignation to be confirmed subject to an exit interview to be held by the personnel committee.

As the council is now able to hold meetings face to face, the power of delegation used in resent meetings is suspended and normal parish council activities resumed.

The concrete bases for the outdoor table tennis tables are now in place, assembly to be completed by a working party of councilors and volunteers.

The Stukeleys Pocket Park Project of redeveloping Great Stukeley Playing Field into Recreation Facility / Pocket Park. Cllr. Smith voiced concerns regarding public support for project and proposed a public exhibition take place before fully committing Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funds to the project.

Following an onsite visit by Cllr's. TP, GE and TC with allotments Chairman David Silsby regarding the serviceability of the hand pump for the underground storage tank and the condition of the overground water butts it was agreed that the council allot funds inro. £1100.00 to purchase a replacement pump, a service kit for the original pump and two 1000ltr tanks. Cllr. TC to advise allotment committee, and following their agreement, place an order.

As all residents are aware work has commenced on the traffic calming programme undertaken by contractors Breheney in conjunction with the Parish Council and Urban & Civic. This has, and is, causing some short-term level of inconvenience to villagers, but as of now the project is running to scale. A site meeting will take place between all parties involved to check on progress.

The meeting concluded at 20.45. Next meeting will be at Great Stukeley village Hall at 7.15pm on the 6th September 2021.

Irene Mae Holohan 1939 - 2021 A village life



Irene Holohan will be remembered as a gentle and kindly person who lived her whole life within the village of Great Stukeley where she will be greatly missed.

Yet, along with her twin sister Marion, she was born in London as war clouds darkened, heralding the outbreak of the Second World War. Her parents Eva and Robert Wenholt lived in Highgate, north London. At the outbreak of the war, they took the difficult decision to allow Margaret, their first child, to be evacuated to

a family in Needingworth. Determined to keep the family together Eva managed to move to Huntingdonshire with all three girls - first to Godmanchester and then to Owl End, Great Stukeley. Irene never left the village she loved and grew up in.

Irene attended Great Stukeley Church of England School, and then aged 11 moved to the Huntingdon Secondary School on Brookside in Huntingdon. On leaving there she started work at the Silent Channel Company in the centre of Huntingdon. We are told she was even persuaded to represent the firm in a yellow swimsuit at Huntingdon's carnival in 1960.

Then she was introduced to a work colleague's nephew, David Holohan. They married in 1963 in St Bartholomew's Church in the village with the reception in the WI Hall (green tin, ex-First World War, known at the WI "hut"). They set up home in a cottage on Brookfield Farm until moving into a house on West View. They stayed there until the end of their lives.

Irene enjoyed village life, always entering the village show, winning trophies with produce, sweet peas, cakes and her prized shortbread. She was often seen on her bicycle, regularly going shopping into Huntingdon and over to Godmanchester to see her sister Margaret.

Her twin sister, Marion, had a different destiny. She married a USAF serviceman and so eventually moved over 5,000 miles away to live in sunny California. The eldest sister, Margaret, married and moved not quite so far away - to Godmanchester - and has written three books about growing up and village life which are an amazing treasure-trove of information about Great Stukeley's social history.

Sadly, David died in 2016 and Irene missed him greatly but was well supported by her two daughters, Amanda and Louise, and friends in the village.

Irene is survived by her two sisters, her daughters and her grandchildren, Molly, Emma, Annabelle and Alexander. Irene's funeral on the 24th June was, of course, fittingly held in St Bartholomew's Church in the village she loved.

ROAD WORKS ON ERMINE STREET

I am extremely concerned about the approach to the road works planned for Ermine Street in the Stukeley's which fail to deal adequately with the safety issues affecting both our villages.

1.We need STOP signs and ROAD MARKINGS on both sides of the road at the two Ermine Street entrances to Church Road in Great Stukeley and to the Ermine Street entrance to Low Road in Little Stukeley. There have already been several accidents in Great Stukeley as cars speed by these intersections on their way through the Stukeleys' as well as a number of near misses. Due to safety concerns about the first Church Road/Ermine Street intersection many of the Great Stukeley residents now use the Church Road/Ermine intersection by the Pub to enter and exit Church Road. SLOW MARKINGS have proved to be totally inadequate safeguards.

Fixed mirrors to enable drivers to see around the corners in these blind spots would also be a very useful safety enhancement.

2.Tabletop Road humps should be placed along Ermine Street rather than a mix with the existing speed cushions. The latter have no impact on the speed of trucks, busses, vans, and SUV's going through the villages since they all have higher road clearance than cars. Nevertheless, some non-villagers now overtake cars which slow down to navigate the speed cushions making these speed limitations unfit for purpose. Incidentally, the current closure of the entrance to Little Stukeley has shown that traffic entering our Villages has dropped substantially demonstrating the high volume of non-village vehicles that normally use this route.

- 3.The population of both villages have a high proportion of pensioners. In addition, the traffic through our villages carries a high proportion of non-local traffic who use the B1043 as a rat run. We need to keep the speed limit to a maximum of 30mph beginning at the entrance opposite the Shell Garage and continuing right throughout the villages to ensure speed consistency as well as to make Ermine Street a less desirable route.
- 4. I note that there is no mention or actions to be taken to reduce the growing number of trucks weighing over 7 tons from entering and transiting our villages.
- 5. There is no mention in the "Ermine Street Works." leaflet issued, I presume by U & C, of what type of Gateway Feature is to be used for both village entrances. For the entrance to Great Stukeley the ideal position would be before John Major's house on a straight section of road before the bend.

I note in the introduction to the "Ermine Street Works" leaflet there is no mention whatsoever of any review by the Villagers of the new traffic calming measures or whether they have been formally consulted on their experience and thoughts before the road works went ahead. As a result, the proposal is a minimalistic and low-cost approach to road safety through the villages. In fact, more attention appears to be focused on the new playing field to be used by *some*, rather than reducing the risk to the lives of *all* our, villagers. Which is more important to our community? The above suggestions are not expensive and if no other means are available there should be enough CIL money available to fund these important safety measures that are designed to benefit the residents of both our villages.
