New recycling video launched

Over the festive period, the Household Recycling Centres have been busy as residents have been bringing along old items - which have then either been recycled or are available in the centres' resale areas.

For example, in the last couple of weeks the following have been left: a Clay pigeon trap, a marble clock, an aluminium drinks bar, two pairs of skis and a dining room table.

To help residents know what can be taken to the centres, how they work and the help which is available, a new film has been launched and can be seen at www.recap.co.uk.

The film - which sees the return of animated characters first seen in local waste education videos last year - explains how to make the best use of the centres in Cambridgeshire and help to reduce the amount of waste which goes to landfill.

Currently the centres recycle 79 per cent of the materials which are taken there, reuse over 475 tonnes of good quality items, and have 22,400 visitors during an average week.

Be prepared for winter and beat the cold

Winter conditions can be seriously bad for our health, especially for those aged 65 or more, under 5 years old, and for people who have an ongoing health problem.

The cold weather can increase the risk of raising blood pressure, heart attacks and strokes.

People with chest conditions are at particular at risk of becoming ill during periods of cold and damp weather, ice, snow and high winds.

But there are lots of things you can do to stay well this winter. Read below our simple tips about keeping warm and well.

Heat the home well: Heat the home to a minimum of 18°C (65°F), and make sure you are dressed appropriately for the weather. Above this and people may be wasting money; below this and there is a risk health. This will keep the home warm and may lower the bills

Get financial support: there are grants, benefits and

sources of advice available to make the home more

energy efficient, improve the heating, or help with bills.

Find out about Warm Homes Grants for vulnerable individuals and families

Eat well and have plenty of fluids: food and water are vital sources of energy; they help keep a person's body warm. People should make sure they and their family have hot meals and drinks regularly throughout the day.

Get a flu jab: certain groups can get free flu jabs to protect against seasonal flu, including the over 65s, pregnant women, people with a long term illness or if someone is the main carer of an elderly or disabled person. Free flu jabs are available from your GPs and some pharmacies.

Look after yourself and others: on cold days try to avoid going outside. If a person does need to venture out, they need to wrap up warm and take care on slippery surfaces. Look out for an older or vulnerable neighbour or relative during this winter to make sure they are safe and well.

Our advice to residents is always this: If someone says they are from the County Council, get their name and tell them you will call them back. Phone our General Enquiries line on 0345 045 5200 and ask to be put through to the named officer. • Be wary of all unsolicited calls. They might start by asking about 'your recent accident' or 'your recent fall' or 'your claim for PPI' or 'your computer problems'. They say it to everyone. They don't know you. • Don't ever give out any personal or financial information over the phone.

Farms for rent

Future farmers and entrepreneurs are being offered the exciting and life changing chance to start their own rural business in the Cambridgeshire countryside from October 2016

Cambridgeshire County Council's Farms Estate, the largest of its kind in England and Wales at over 33,000 acres, has four holdings looking for new tenants

The tenancies include:

Ransonmoor II Farm, near March comprises a single block of fertile root growing land totalling 287 acres, including ranges of buildings and a modern 3 bedroom bungalow.

Plantation Farm, near Ramsey, totals 197acres of fen

soils with a range of buildings and a 3 bedroom

bungalow.

Longfield Farm, on the edge of Cambridge, extends to 141acres of combinable land with the option of a 3 bedroom farmhouse.

Stonebridge Farm, near March is a 7acre holding offering an opportunity to create a range rural enterprises. These holdings provide a valuable opportunity for interested parties either to take their first steps on the farming ladder or to progress onto larger farms.

Unanimous agreement to keep streetlights on longer

Members of Highways and Community Infrastructure have agreed to support extending streetlights staying on until 2am instead of the planned midnight switch-off after hearing the results and proposals of a public survey. The Council is looking to follow the lead of more than 60 councils across the country, which have already turned off or dimmed street lights, which would have saved around £260,000 from an annual cost of over £1.4m a year.

Councillors also heard around nine councils, including Cambridge City Council, have come forward to offer to fund the lights staying on after the proposed switch off time.

This means the committee are recommending to Full Council:

To increase the current period of streetlight dimming (8pm or 10pm until 6am) to all times and turning off lighting not on main traffic routes between 2am and 6am where it is controlled by the Council's Central Management System;

The Council is not proposing to turn off lighting on main traffic routes, where CCTV cameras are present, where there are any statutory requirements or where they support the night time economy. The Committee heard that the changed time means the Council would have to find an extra £98,000 from efficiencies.

Ermine Street enhancements – public exhibitions to show plans

As part of the development of Alconbury Weald, Urban&Civic agreed to fund environmental enhancements along Ermine Street through the Stukeleys villages. The scheme aims to both provide a more rural setting for the road, and in turn deter cars from driving through the villages as a "quick rat run". The work will be carried out in parallel with Highways England investment in the A14 at Spittals, which will improve the main route to Huntingdon and Cambridge.

Plans for these enhancements have been developed in partnership with the County and District Council Highways teams, and through a working group on traffic issues led by representatives from the Parish Council.

A series of public events have been organised by Urban&Civic and Stukeleys' Parish Council to share the proposals before they are finalised, and to talk through the principles and process behind the planned work. The enhancements need to be in place before the 250th home is occupied at Alconbury Weald, which is likely to be in the first half of 2018.

The events will be held:

Little Stukeley Village Hall: Monday 29 February: 1530 – 2000 Great Stukeley Village Hall: Wednesday 2 March: 1500 – 2000 Alconbury Weald Club Building: Friday 4 March: 1500 – 2000

The Club building is the new building next to the Incubator building and this will be the first event the building hosts.

Rebecca Britton, Communities and Partnerships, for Urban&Civic, said: "From the earliest discussions with the Parish Council and local residents, we knew that as part of the development coming forward, we needed to develop transport plans which minimised the impact on the Stukeleys and led to real benefits for local residents. Some of those benefits will be in facilities coming forward on the site, but the Ermine Street enhancements we believe also provide a real opportunity to ensure and protect a more rural setting and identity for both villages. We look forward to testing the thinking and plans through these events."

Michael Monk, Parish Councillor and Chairman of the Traffic Group, said: "For too long our community has suffered from the number and speed of vehicles passing through the heart of our villages. Previous attempts to deal with this have largely failed because of insufficient finance to do a proper job. This is our chance to do something effective. I hope as many people as possible will come to see the plans and comment on them."

A return to Kings Cross plus two journeys by tube for £20.15p!

"How is this possible" I hear you say when the full price return is £53.00p with tube travel. Now the £53.00p price assumes you want to leave before 09-00hrs and return at any time including during the rush `hour`, 16-30hrs to 19-00hrs.

Now us oldies don't like to arise too early and for definite the Memsahibs want an hour and a half or even two to get ready so let's say you can get to the station for the 09-01hrs train. Now that's an off peak train and the return fare then drops to £33-90p but of course you cannot return during the `rush hour` from Kings Cross; you have to wait until the 19-10hrs departure or get a train before 16-30hrs. That cuts down the Memsahibs shopping time.

BUT crafty Bumbling knows a way around this!

You just say to the ticket wallah that you wish to purchase a day return to Epsom in Surrey and you will be taking the 09-01hrs to Kings Cross. Now that ticket allows you to break your journey in London and gives you two tube rides as well. BUT the beauty of it is that you can return using ANY train at all. The price is £30-50p return. (Chaps this is where you have to explain to the dear lady you don't have to actually go to Epsom, doh!). Now buy this ticket using your `Senior` rail card and the price drops to the startling one of £20-15p! That's a brilliant saving of £13-90p over the normal off peak return and a massive £32-85p off a peak return ticket with tube and you get full flexibility on your return journey time.

That's a lot of G&T availability or indeed you could treat the Memsahib to half a bottle at the Champagne bar at St Pancras.

Martyn, I send this email in response to one recently published in the magazine.

As I am certain, most readers will know I was Clerk to the Council for some thirty-eight years. I have since my retirement kept my thoughts to myself because I felt it was prudent to do so. But, reading Ms Baldwinsons rantings of last month has 'stung' me into a response! I do appear to have been dragged into her obvious annovance with 'Bumbling Bob' possibly by default. I feel that her comments of, by association, that I during my term as clerk, did not report fully the activities of the Council properly, indeed, possibly tried to conceal some items, to be not only ill informed but extremely offensive, if she has actual proof of my inefficiencies I would very much appreciate the evidence. My instructions at all times were to report all attendances and to précis all the important issues from each monthly meeting, it was well known that all full minutes and agendas were displayed in all Parish Notice Boards at least five working days prior to the next scheduled meeting, this was done without fail, the full minutes were also published on the Parish Website, these measures were strictly adhered too as it was Council Policy to keep all Parishioners, who were interested, well informed and wherever possible engaged in Parish Affairs.

I believe that ill-informed persons like Ms Baldwinson have very little appreciation of the very limited powers that a Parish Council actually has, it has been my opinion for many years, and I know it is similar to other serving and retired SPC members, the only real thing the Parish Council has some measure of control over, provision of 'local' services such as lighting, street maintenance(grass cutting) the provision of services such as salt in winter months(noted this is the second winter on the trot that the existing bins have not been replenished), with other local issues the Parish Council is virtually at the behest of the District on Planning Issues and the County on Highway matters, if either authority does not concur with the Parish view the higher authority normally prevails.

What has to be appreciated is that some of our elected (sadly only 25% of the population vote in local elections) have full time jobs and then give their leisure time freely in their efforts to serve their community, on the Parish Council. I have always been of the opinion that mistakes are made, who in our society can say they have never made one, but during my time many very good things were achieved by the Council Members that I served, these with not a great deal of thanks or appreciation, but when controversial decisions were made, criticisms were quick to ensue, but that is 'par for the course' and something that most Councillors have to accept.

The one issue to which the correspondent refers that I am in total agreement with, is the one of Michael Monk, he was indeed, as I said in the magazine when I retired, a well-informed Tower of strength to both the Council and in particular myself, he was always caring for the community and gave of his time(in the earlier days he had a full time high profile job with South Cambs DC)most generously to me in proofing minutes on many, many occasions, he is truly a very good and approachable 'village' Councillor, he will as you say be sadly missed when he does 'retire'. I am sure, as someone I consider to be a friend, won't mind me saying, that I have always thought and still do, the developers of RAF Alconbury as well as the MOD have an agenda for the area and despite all our protestations over many years, they are going ahead with it, the two new entrances (bitterly opposed by SPC) are an unfortunate indication of their intentions. I clearly remember our first meeting with Urban & Civic in which they clearly advised, they had huge plans for the area, they 'they would like to take the local communities with them' but please remember, 'our first responsibility is too our shareholders' (if Ms Baldwinson has a mind to check the relevant minutes, I think she will find it adequately minuted!!) I think that sums up their mind-set.

I would agree that upon my retirement I was replaced by a 'Full Time' professional Clerk(she does not have a full time professional occupation as well other than serving the Hemingford's in a similar capacity), whom I was involved in the selection thereof, I fully believe she is doing an excellent job for our communities, but please remember, she has one significant disadvantage, that is she does not live in the villages and thus relies on information supplied to her by her members to take any appropriate action necessary, she has been on the occasions I have contacted her very efficient in both her response and actions, I would not deem to fault her in any way.

In conclusion I would proffer, that in the entirety of my service to the Parish Council as a part time clerk, I believe I always gave of my best and at all times I sincerely acted in what I considered to be a professional manner befitting that of a public servant, in the process always serving the Council and my community to the best of my ability, and for you Ms Baldwinson to suggest otherwise is deeply offensive! I have undoubtedly made mistakes during that time, if she has any particular proof of any of my inefficiencies I would dearly like the evidence, otherwise a public apology would suffice.

Sorry to have taken up so much space, but I was 'needled' into the length of this response!!!


