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#### WANTED Items for the Magazine. All things considered.

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The government is not currently planning to extend the remote meeting regulations beyond 7 May 2021. Along with other local government bodies, the National Association of Local councils [NALC] is continuing to press for an extension. They are also preparing guidance for local councils on preparing for and managing the return to physical meetings in May and beyond if required.

Rebecca Britain and Joe Dawson of Urban and Civic [U&C] gave a report and update on a few developments, relating to progress on the Southern Gateway, and developments within Alconbury Weald.

The original design concept of a roundabout at the junction with the Southern Gateway and the A141 was rejected by the Highways Department in favour of a controlled T junction, a new design has been submitted by U&C for approval.

Updated plans for a Café within the Watch Tower, to be run by a local company, will go in later this month as well as plans for a further 480 houses on two, yet to be developed, sites.

The pre planning application submission for remodelling the Gt Stukeley playing field to create a community recreation has been submitted to Huntingdon District council [HDC] on behalf of the Stukeleys Parish Council by planning advisor Tim Slater. Reference: 21/70010/PENQ.

The Neighbourhood Plan [NP] was discussed, on the advice of HDC Councillor Tom Sanderson a proposal was passed to invite assistance from the Planning Policy Team Leader at HDC. An initial meeting has been arranged via ZOOM SPC councillors Smith, Burton and Close to attend.

It was agreed to purchase snow drop and bluebell bulbs for planting on the freshly tidied tumuli and to extend clearing the playing field hedge. Also, a quote was received and accepted to supply a grate to be installed at the culvert at Owl End.

As a guard against Covid 19, contractors continue with a monthly deep clean on play equipment at both village playing fields.

Until further notice SPC meetings will continue to be held via ZOOM, anyone wishing to attend please contact <u>clerk@thestukeleys-pc.gov.uk</u>.

The next PC meeting is scheduled on Mon 1 March 2021 at 7.15pm.

Alert - Coronavirus Vaccination Scams

Dear subscriber,

As of 7 January 2021, Action Fraud had received 57 reports from members of the public who have been sent text messages claiming to be from the NHS, offering them the opportunity to sign up for coronavirus vaccinations. The texts ask the recipient to click on a link which takes them to an online form where they are prompted to input personal and financial details. In some cases the online form has looked very similar to the real NHS website.

#### Pauline Smith, Head of Action Fraud, said:

"Remember, the vaccine is only available on the NHS and is free of charge. The NHS will never ask you for details about your bank account or to pay for the vaccine. If you receive an email, text message or phone call purporting to be from the NHS and you are asked to provide financial details, this is a scam."

#### How to protect yourself:

In the UK, coronavirus vaccinations will only be available via the National Health Services of England, Northern Ireland, Wales and Scotland. You can be contacted by the NHS, your employer, a local GP surgery or pharmacy, to receive your vaccination. **Remember, the vaccinations are free of charge and you will not be asked for a payment.** 

#### The NHS will never:

- ask for your bank account or card details
- ask for your PIN or banking passwords
- arrive unannounced at your home to administer the vaccine
- ask for documentation to prove your identity, such as a passport or utility bills

If you receive a call you believe to be fraudulent, hang up. If you are suspicious about an email you have received, forward it to <u>report@phishing.gov.uk</u>. Suspicious text messages should be forwarded to the number 7726, which is free of charge.

If you believe you are the victim of a fraud, please report this to Action Fraud as soon as possible by calling 0300 123 2040 or visiting <u>www.actionfraud.police.uk</u>.

# **Great Stukeley Customs**

Your readers might be interested in some other material gathered by the Huntingdonshire Local History Society Research Group.

A number of villagers, including Jim Haynes (70), Mrs Stukins (50) and Mrs Waldock Snr (90+), were interviewed in the early 1970s. They talked about some customs in Great Stukeley.

**May Day**: Apparently this was a children's event- they processed round the village, wearing garlands, "May singing", to get money. Milk and cake were given to them at farms and the day finished at the school, with Maypole dancing (either on a grass field, in the school yard, or inside the school itself) and with tea for parents provide by the vicar's wife. A May Queen (a girl around 4 years old) would be elected.

**Great Stukeley Feast**- Various dates were suggested for this- second Sunday in September, first Sunday in September after the 5<sup>th</sup>, or St Bartholomew's Day (August 24th). It was held in the field behind the (previous) Three Horseshoes pub (with refreshments in the pub- the publican, Mr Sheldon, brewed his own beer). There would be a travelling fair with roundabouts, flying horses and stalls, including a toy stall, dancing tent and a fiddler. It probably stopped in the early 1920s.

**Plough witching**- on the first Monday in January plough drivers, carrying whips and with faces blacked, pulled ploughs round the village, calling at houses and singing, collecting money-which was divided as pocket money. I expect some readers will know about the revival, around 1980 of the once broadly similar Plough Monday custom in Whittlesey.

**Harvest**- there would be stick of rock and a glass of sherbert for the lad that let the least sheaves fall during collection and the farmer would give the men beer and cheese.

## Mrs Thackray and "All Our Yesterdays" A 2nd extract.

In the 1980s Great Stukeley resident Mrs Dorothy Thackray (1900 - 1991) wrote a fascinating account entitled "All our yesterdays" for the Stukeleys Parish Magazine. In January's magazine we published extracts from her book recording life in the years up to the First World War.

In this extract she recalls the Stukeleys during the upheavals of the Second World War.

"With the coming of the 2nd World war the villages gave evacuee children a welcome. Harold (*Ed: her husband*) met Mrs. Wendholt and her newly born twins at Huntingdon Station. Perhaps our two village schools found the challenge the hardest to meet. Herbert and Madge Haynes were living in the old vicarage when they were first married, .....Madge moved down to her Mother's in Huntingdon when Herbert joined the Royal Air Force. Basil Hayward joined the Navy and, on HMS Derby, went on the ghastly Murmansk convoy run, there and back twice for us amidst the ice, submarines and bombers. Many of our men joined the Navy. Bob Stukins, Stanley Hobbs, who had been looking after the Rev. Wilford (*Ed: at that time note, living at 33 Church Road!*), was on Admiral Cunningham's flagship in the Mediterranean....Dick and Arthur Papworth at Dunkirk...

Our older men were in The Home Guard or Specials and spent many nights "fire watching" in factories in Huntingdon or inspecting black out curtains. Gas masks and rationing, though we in the country were more fortunate than those in the towns. Harold bought 5 sows and with Arthur Hitchcock's help reared many pigs. Arthur was a good curer of a ham. I helped milk 2 cows, making butter and rearing chickens....a small pat of butter and a few eggs, a cockerel or a rabbit - what a luxury!...We managed on 2 oz of fat a week, 1/2lb of sugar, 6 oz of meat, cheese too was rationed and by the end so was bread.

Petrol was rationed so we walked or cycled. Harold had a Shetland pony sent down from Scotland and made a trap out of a converted large hand cart for picnics and relaxation. I helped at hay time and harvest at Brookfield and potato picking at the Grange. Women helped out at harvest time alongside Irishmen -

still then the old-fashioned stooking and threshing. Harold had over 30 Irishmen in huts at Wyton working all around the clock.

A decoy airfield in a lonely field 2 or 3 miles from Norman Cross helped save Peterborough's brickworks and engineering factories. All our signposts and milestones were removed.

One of my sisters and Miss Eileen Thackray drove an ambulance 2 nights a week - quite difficult finding a patient in a village with no headlights and every cottage blacked out, and then turning an ambulance in a dark lane. Their worst night was the night of a lorry crash at the bottom of our village hill when 6 young airmen were killed and they had to take them to the Huntingdon mortuary.

The Germans dropped several bombs looking for our aerodromes....a cow was killed at Brookfield and a part of a ceiling brought down in the (*Ed: farm*)house. Another night a stick of fire bombs fell across the Park setting fire to Charlie Deller's barn at Green End but he soon put out the fire while Kate Byford with her bucket and sand - as we had been taught - soon coped with a fire bomb outside our garage.

Being so near aerodromes, the noise of bombers starting up was terrific - Little Stukeley suffered greatly. Towards the end of the war there would be as many as 250 bombers high up in the sky getting ready in formation. Many came limping home not much higher than the hedges.

We had Red Cross fetes in the Park, with bowling for a pig given by George Gifford, and we managed the teas from the old WI hut (*Ed: at the corner of Ermine Street/Owl End close to the new Great Stukeley Village Hall*). Stukeley Hall was commandeered by the Americans as their H.Q. when they took over Alconbury Airfield.

We remember the night sky all aglow in the south with the bombing and fires of London - hearing enemy planes going overhead, flight after flight for the bombing of Coventry and the Midlands."

To everyone who has been involved in helping to deliver the first 10,000 vaccines to our most vulnerable residents and workers, across the A1 network, which includes Alconbury and Brampton surgeries, Almond Road, Buckden and Little Paxton, Kimbolton and Sawtry (Wellside) surgeries, a huge THANK YOU!

From the core team who have worked long days 7 days a week for the last 3 weeks, to all the practice staff, who have either been part of vaccine teams or supported them by doing the daily work of General Practice, to the many fabulous volunteers helping with every aspect of vaccine logistics (and often in the freezing cold), and the volunteers who are ready and waiting to help in the next run of clinics, to the locals who put up with the additional traffic, to the friends and neighbours who brought frail people to the vaccination hubs, and to the people being vaccinated, who are helping to defeat the virus just by being vaccinated-

## Thank you!

This is just the start of a long process, and there will be a few more challenges yet, but we are learning how to make the process better at each clinic, and look forward to being able to plan clinics with known vaccine delivery dates (currently we are given less than a week's notice of delivery), and letting those people who have yet to get their vaccine know when it will be available.

If you have not yet been vaccinated, or know someone locally who has not yet been vaccinated and are aged over 65, vulnerable, or are a health or social care worker, please let your local practice know. Everyone who has not yet been vaccinated (at any age) can also help the programme by making sure that your GP practice has correct contact details (ideally a mobile phone number), as you will be contacted by text to book your appointment via an automated system. The text originally came from book.nhs.me but now comes from accurx.thirdparty.nhs.uk and takes you to a survey link to book your appointment. This should help you to tell it is not a scam. If you do not have a mobile phone, someone will contact you on your landline to book your appointment, or send a letter from your practice.

Don't forget- the vaccine will not yet provide full protection and you must still distance etc.

## UPDATE FROM ALCONBURY WEALD

Since the first residents moved in to Alconbury Weald over four years ago, over 470 houses are now occupied, and our community continues to pull together and thrive despite the challenges presented by the pandemic. We have a number of exciting new community facilities coming forward in early 2021; The Pavilion community centre is due to be completed in the Spring, with an anchor use as a cricket pavilion and with social space for functions and events overlooking the cricket pitch. The Pavilion will also provide a flexible community hall, kitchens and toilets, and include an office for the development's Communities Team. We will continue to work with Cricket East and our communities to organise events and allow bookings for the space when the Covid-19 restrictions lift, so everyone can enjoy this fantastic new community facility.

Plans are underway for The Glade which will bring forward a brand-new local centre to complement the existing facilities around the Primary School, Swynford Stores and community park, and extend the cluster of facilities and amenities growing out from the Club, Watch Office and Cricket pitch. At the heart of the development will be a new convenience store – run by the Co-op; a nursery run by Mother Goose Nursery; and a flexible working hub as well as green space for people to enjoy. Before the plans are finalised and submitted later in the Spring, we want to ensure residents and neighbours of Alconbury Weald have their say and so are trialling a new online consultation approach to share the latest details and gather feedback. This will then be drawn into the final plans submitted for formal consultation with the community and key partners.

We hope the approach gets people excited about helping shape the plans for the Glade, which will be an important addition to the facilities at Alconbury Weald including providing additional green space for people to explore and for hosting outdoor cinema and other events. ## Care worker stole from 100-year-old woman.

Creating a safer Cambridgeshire

A care worker stole cash and other valuables from a 100-year-old woman she should have been looking after.

Andrea Goldfinch, 55, was conducting a daily care visit at a property in St Neots on 3 January last year when she stole items from the victim's bedroom.

The victim's family had set up CCTV cameras in the bedroom, which captured footage of Goldfinch stealing the victim's purse from her handbag.

About £1400 in cash, two 24-carat Guyanese bangles, a bank card, and the keys and key fob to the property and communal entrance were also taken.

The victim's daughter contacted police and Goldfinch, of Crown Walk, Eaton Socon, was suspended from her position immediately.

Today (12 February) at Peterborough Crown Court she was sentenced to 24 months in prison, suspended for 24 months, after previously pleading guilty to theft.

Sergeant Clare Lightfoot said: "Goldfinch was in a position of trust which she abused in an appalling way.

"Had the family not installed the cameras this crime might never have come to light, like many crimes against vulnerable people behind closed doors.

"Of course, not every care worker is out to commit crime; there are some wonderful people doing fantastic work, but I would always urge people to pay close attention to their loved ones and their possessions and report anything suspicious."

## Beware Romance Fraud

Romance fraudsters are scamming victims out of more than £7,000!

That's according to new data from UK Finance while Action Fraud has revealed romance fraud incidents have rocketed during lockdown.

Scammers set up fake profiles to lure their victims in, promising love and happiness and building what seems to be a genuine, trusting online relationship before asking victims to help them out with financial issues or travel costs so they can visit them in person.

#### Remember:

- Be suspicious of any requests for money from someone you have only met online.
- Speak to your family and friends to get a second opinion if you're unsure.
- Do a reverse image search to check if someone has used a fake profile picture.

#### Never:

- Share your bank details with someone you've met online
- Transfer money on their behalf
- Take out a loan for them
- Provide copies of your personal documents such as passports or driving licenses
- Invest your own money on their behalf or on their advice
- Purchase and send the codes on gift cards from Amazon or iTunes
- Agree to receive and/or send parcels on their behalf (laptops, mobile phones etc.)

#### Walk your walk to help carers to attend COVID-19 vaccinations

Local charity Caring Together is providing free and tailored support for people looking after a family member or friend, so they and the person they care for can get to their appointment for the COVID-19 vaccination.

And they are inviting you to walk your walk for carers this March to raise money so that they can continue to provide this and other support to carers during the coronavirus pandemic.

Whether you choose to set yourself a challenge based on the number of steps you walk, the distance you want to cover or the amount of time you spend walking you can raise money to help carers.

People who are most vulnerable are being prioritised for the COVID-19 vaccination, and as the priority categories are worked through people looking after a family member or friend will also then be invited for their own COVID-19 vaccination.

But whether it is the appointment for the person they look after, or for themselves, carers face many challenges in getting to medical appointments. So, the free support from Caring Together can make the difference in whether they can go to their appointment or not.



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
