

October Stukeleys Parish Council Report

The October Stukeleys Parish Council meeting was held via ZOOM.

Rebecca Briton from Urban & Civic was invited to give an update and report on the Alconbury Weald, currently there are now 370 properties occupied. Work is progressing on the Cambridge County Council headquarters; Hopkins homes are underway with a second phase of housing and plans are in place for the secondary school with a proposed completion by September 2023. As part of continued development, demolition contractors will be at work between 8.30 and 5.00 on weekdays and 8.30 to 1.00 an Saturdays. U&C are in discussions with several organisations to advise on the design, development, and management of the Stukeleys Country Park.

The MAGPAS headquarters application on Alconbury Weald was approved by the Huntingdon Development Management Committee with a recommendation from SPC that no future development takes place on the proposed site that may impact further on the neighbouring properties.

The appointed contractors for Stukeleys Pocket Park are moving forward with a design concept and applications were invited by public advert regarding establishing and managing the Neighbourhood Plan.

A request was received from the Stukeleys Heritage Group regarding the management of the Romano-British burial grounds in Gt Stukeley, the SPC will instruct our groundworks contractors to inspect and carry out works required.

It was agreed that the editor of the Stukeleys Magazine has the full support of the SPC regarding any correspondence that he may consider distressing or vexatious and unsuitable for publishing in the future.

As it looks almost certain that until further notice that SPC meetings will continue to be held via ZOOM, anyone wishing to attend please contact <u>clerk@thestukeleys-pc.gov.uk</u>. The date of next meeting is Monday2 November at 7.15pm.

Partners Update: As winter approaches and cases of Covid-19 are on the increase nationally we would like to reassure you of our commitment to deliver good healthcare in a safe way within the community. GP appointments always have, and continue to be available but will be via telephone in the first instance in line with Department of Health national Guidance. We also continue to provide video consultations and where clinically necessary will offer patients a face to face appointment.

We have opened up our Nurse and HCA appointments to recommence services that can be delivered in a way that protects patients and our team but to do so means that our capacity is reduced by a third. Please bear with us if wait times are a little longer than previously experienced. I would like to reassure patients that we are and always have been open and would encourage that you seek medical advice should you need it.

Our team have been working conscientiously and consistently since March to deliver continuity of care within constantly changing guidance. The next few months are likely to bring further challenges and I ask that our patients be understanding of the ongoing pressures under which we are working as we endeavour to meet their needs.

New technology:

Accurx This is the platform we use to host video consultations, share photo images and send patients SMS messages. It is fully accredited in terms of national standards for confidentiality. Doctorlink This service is available to help patients check their symptoms to ensure that they are seen by the service most suited to their needs, including appointments at the Surgery. NHS APP can be used by patient's age 16+ to make appointments, order medication, view results and access their online medical records.

Team Changes; As a member of the A1 Primary Care Network we now have a Physiotherapist at the Practice one day a week, Simon Margot, who will be working to support our GPs in managing musculoskeletal issues. We also have Social Link Worker, Andrew Hall, who will be able to work with patients to access non-clinical services available locally. We have a new Dispenser, Charlotte, a new secretary Jane and a new receptionist at Brampton, Dawn and we would like to take this opportunity to welcome them to the Practice Team. Dr Kooverjee is returning from maternity leave and we currently have GP Trainees Drs Hlaing, Goburdhone, Pollock, Qureshi, Vincent, Kelly and Badawi with us at the Practice. The hosting of medical students from Cambridge University has recommenced and we appreciate your ongoing support as we implement new ways of supporting the GPs of the future in their training.

Albram Many members of our patient group are still working to help support vulnerable patients in their local community but regret that they have had to suspend their volunteer drivers service. The Practice would like to express their sincere gratitude for the ongoing volunteer support being offered to our Patients by the local community.

Drugs Cash and Weapons Seized During Warrants

Drugs, cash and weapons have been seized and six people arrested during as part of a series of warrants in Huntingdonshire.

Officers from the Huntingdon Neighbourhood Team have carried out five warrants in Brampton, Farcet, Yaxley and Huntingdon in a bid to crack down on drug related crime.

On Sunday they were in Beasley Road, Brampton where they seized a number of imitation firearms and weapons as well as Class A drugs. A 33-year-old man was arrested on suspicion of possession of class A drugs and possession of a firearm. He was later released under investigation.

Officers then located a cannabis factory in Conquest Drive, Farcet on Monday. Around 37 plants were recovered, and a 46-year-old man was arrested on suspicion of cultivating cannabis. He was later released under investigation.

A drugs warrant was carried out at a property in Laburnum Avenue, Yaxley on Tuesday. Drugs and weapons were found at the address and an investigation is ongoing into the supply of drugs.

Later that day the team were at Hawthorn Road where cannabis was recovered and a 26-year-old woman was reported for possession of cannabis.

Then at a property in Terrill Close, Huntingdon, they arrested a 19-year-old man from Cambridge on suspicion of robbery and possession with intent to supply class A drugs and a 20-year-old man from London on suspicion of possession with intent to supply class A drugs and possession of drugs. They have both been bailed to return to Thorpe Wood police station next month.

Early Wednesday morning the team arrested a 21-year-old man on suspicion of fraud, being concerned in the supply of drugs and possession of drugs and a 24-year-old man on suspicion of possession with intent to supply class A drugs and possession of drugs following a warrant in Percy Green Place, Stukeley. Cash, drugs and weapons were seized along with items of high value clothing. They have both been released under investigation.

Drug dealing, and organised crime remain a priority for the neighbourhood team. We will continue to relentlessly pursue those involved in the illegal supply of drugs to prevent the harm that their activity does to our communities and our most vulnerable residents.

Update from Alconbury Weald

It has been a strange few months and the Alconbury Weald community continues to thrive, albeit within the Coronavirus restrictions to help reduce the spread of the virus. Over 400 homes are now occupied and we're looking forward to welcoming more new residents this Autumn.

While many of our community events remain on hold, this October we launched a *Halloweald* Trail with 20 spooky hauntings for people to find, and a photo competition for the spookiest costume. Our resident Book Club is also doing well and our lucky dip library book bag (available until libraries open again for browsing) are proving very popular, especially with our younger residents.

We were also planning to open up the nuclear bunker at Alconbury Weald as part of the Heritage Open Days events in September, but sadly this was unable to take place under the current restrictions. We did, however, produce a virtual tour, which is available on our website for anyone interested in finding out more about this fascinating Cold War building: <u>www.alconbury-weald.co.uk/about/heritage/bunker-tour/</u>. In November we are hoping to mark Remembrance Sunday with a small event at Watch Office Green, subject to Coronavirus guidance.

Due to the restrictions, unfortunately The Café in The Club remains closed but The Gym has now opened to members. The Food Truck Revolution continue to provide a number of tasty treats from an array of cuisines which set up by Swynford Stores, Thursday, Fridays and over the weekend: please go to the Facebook page AlconburyWealdLiving to find the latest times and menus.

The latest developments at Alconbury Weald are also progressing well. We were able to open up the new Garland Park extension before the end of the Summer, so local residents were able to enjoy the new play equipment, including table tennis (with bats and balls available to buy from Swynford Stores) and to connect more of the walking routes around the development. Work is also progressing well with the new County Council Headquarters and the Pavilion is on schedule to open in Spring 2021.

We continue to work with Stukeleys Parish Council and the County Council to refine the enhancements along Ermine Street and put in additional measures to respond to the feedback from residents, and hope a finalised scheme will be agreed in the next couple of weeks. We are also working with Highways England and the County Council to finalise the new signage around the new A14 and A1307 and the local road network to update the signs and support the correct routing of traffic.


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

You will be missed by many

A Tribute to Marie Harrison From Buster Evans

It is with great sorrow and a heavy heart that I have to inform the village that Marie Harrison passed away on the afternoon of Monday the 12th of October, a great stalwart of the village. Marie and her husband Bill moved into the village in 1971 after Bill retired from the RAF. They at once started to get involved in the activities of the village. Bill used to drive the mobile library round the villages until his retirement. Together they ran the Ever Green Club for many years and got heavily involved in helping out with the village annual flower show. Bill was heavily involved with the British legion and was at one time president of the local branch, and took an active part in laying the wreath on the War Memorial on Remembrance Sundays, a task that Marie took on for many years after she lost Bill. You could often find Marie sitting behind the table in the village hall selling raffle tickets for various functions put on by different organisations. Bill used to look after the older people in the village by making sure that they were supplied with firewood and logs to keep their fires burning during winter even though some of them were ten or fifteen years his junior. Bill and Marie for many years both worked at the hospital and Marie carried on long after she lost Bill. She was in fact presented with a medal from the hospital for long service which she was very proud of. Her funeral is being held at the village of Wilsford near Sleaford in Lincolnshire and she is to be buried at St Marys Church Wilsford very close to her daughter and all her relatives





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
