





## STUKELEYS AT FIFTY

It was October 1970 that saw the first issue of STUKELEYS which was distributed to every house in Great and Little Stukeley. Looking through the monthly copies of the first four years of STUKELEYS, they seem, fifty years on, so amateurish – being duplicated and with no advertisements. But they do capture the warmth and friendship which we encountered in the years we lived at 20 Church Road – our first home.

Maurice Newman greatly welcomed the idea of a monthly magazine, but was adamant it must be more than another Church magazine, written by the Vicar (as he was of Great Stukeley) and Rector (of Little Stukeley) – the two parishes had only recently been put together. This was in fact to be a major challenge of the magazine – to help bond the parishes together, as conveyed by the title chosen for the magazine.

A flyer was put through every door in September 1970, which read:

#### IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT

The Stukeleys are going to have their first parish magazine. It will be called STUKELEYS.

#### THIS IS OUR AIM

It will come out monthly – it will be for you and by you – giving news about everything going on in the Stukeleys. It will have articles by people living in the Stukeleys, and everyone will receive a copy. But first of all, will you write something for this magazine? It does not matter how young you are – or old!! Write something funny, sad, miserable ... but write something! Give your contribution to Mr Papworth, 48 Church Road; Mrs Gifford in Little Stukeley, or leave it at the Glendale Stores, where there will be a box for contributions.

The contributions for each issue written on various pieces of paper, or as messages jotted down from phone calls, were passed to us by the 20<sup>th</sup> of the month, and we collated and copy-typed the magazine. The cover was chosen, and stencils were cut in time for a group of willing volunteers to assemble around the church duplicator, which churned out the individual pages. Others stapled the pages together, and Elsie and Arthur Quinlan took them to the local distributers, or in many cases, delivered copies themselves to arrive at every house by the first day of the month.

Maurice Newman wrote in the first issue, 'We want this to be a really corporate effort, not a One Man Band ..., we want to listen to people, understand


their interests and concerns, help them to get in touch with each other and feel that they belong to each other. We want our village to be more than a dormitory where people sleep; we want to make it a live community.'

As well as reports from the British Legion, Evergreen Club, Parish Council and Village Hall Committee, and many more, individual villagers wrote articles, submitted poems, and proffered jokes. Newcomers to the villages were welcomed, and farewells announced for those leaving. Artists of all ages submitted cover designs – memorable ones from those early months were of the Little Stukeley church brass, a very fine owl and a picture for children to colour. There was soon a children's page written by Penny Langley.

Looking back through those early issues, they seem both so innocent in content and primitive in production – but then perhaps the same thing will be thought by someone looking through today's STUKELEYS in fifty years' time – our lives have changed, and will continue to do so at such a pace.

For the two of us, the production of the monthly magazine played a big part in our lives for four years. Our role as editors was not known to many of the villagers, and it was only when we left Great Stukeley that the Vicar revealed the part that we had played in establishing this project. It is good to know that the magazine continues today, and we trust that it will continue to flourish in the future.

Firstly, thank you for editing and producing the Stukeley Parish Magazine, we are avid readers every month and it helps us, with three young children and busy lives, keep connected to the village. Especially important in recent times, when we have all felt some type of isolation, I am sure. As our children get older and a little less "energetic", we hope to become a larger part of the community.

However, we were taken aback by a couple of statements in the "Opinion Piece", labelled "the EXAM question" and "Immigrants from Calais".

In the former, we were really appalled by the final sentence – "I still feel the teenagers of today are a pain and should be shot at dawn!!". # St Bartholomew's Churchyard

There have been a number of occasions lately when questions have been raised regarding the placing of floral and other tributes on graves and the planting of plants on graves in the churchyard. The Church wardens and PCC wish to make it known that the matter is not under their control but is covered by regulations laid down by the Diocese of Ely.

Regulations state that with the exception of Christmas wreaths and poppy tributes, there should be no artificial material placed on graves or tombstones. If you wish to plant flowers or shrubs on graves you must apply to Ely Diocese for a Faculty. Details of how to apply on found on the Ely Diocese website. **facultyonline.churchofengland.org** 

A lot of effort is made to ensure that the churchyard is maintained to the highest standard as a fitting memorial to those who have been laid to rest over centuries. We are but the custodians and are required to ensure that the standards and rules are being followed.

All artificial materials will be removed from the churchyard and held in the South porch until the end of October should anyone wish to recover the items. If you have planted a garden since 2019 without requesting the required Faculty you have until the end of November to apply, after that date the plants will be removed.

<u>www.EAARO.org.uk</u> is an amazing idea and resource for our community. It's a radar astronomy space centre open to the public of all ages and abilities; fully equal opportunities focused. It's a location carrying out real research on our doorstep – somewhere you can use without travelling to Cambridge!

#### Three large experiments:

- · Meteor watching using radar and sensitive sky-pointed cameras
- SETI (The search for extraterrestrial life scientifically)
- Neutrino search (A small, very energetic particle produced by stars colliding)

(This is cutting edge science and a new branch of astronomy)

#### Many smaller experiments:

These are so accessible, that a 12-year-old girl, Erin identified two M class solar flares, later confirmed by NASA! Here's the youtube link to her describing her own experiment. <u>https://bit.ly/3030E5R</u> What a CV, and all produced during lockdown! If you are :

- concerned about children's education suffering in the pandemic, or
- you want to improve your own skills preparing to return to work, or
- just have an interest in space as a hobby,

... you can join in and work on your own experiment.

#### Join a meteor watch event

The peak of the Orionids meteor shower is over the evening of 20<sup>th</sup> October. EAARO are taking bookings for up to 6 people for 50 minutes in an hour (leaving us 10 mins to covid clean). There is a charge for this, and cake, cookies and cocoa (or something else) will be provided. You can join in for free on the live youtube video posting.

## Call for volunteers

Whatever your interest and skills, EAARO needs volunteers please, to help build a transmitter (basic DIYers and techie staff can join in, no previous special skills needed), decorators (we are hoping for a grant, but... appreciate funding is tight.) someone to answer our phone, receptionist for visitors ... serving teas and perhaps baking the odd cake, wanabe scientists of any age.

## Covid restrictions and maintaining your safety

Like museums and cafes, EAARO is open during covid as we write this, but with covid secure limits eg groups of six, facemask requirement, 2m distancing and hand gel stations. There's been a visitors book since the site was created a year ago, so that is our primary track and trace system. For children and the vulnerable in our community, as an educational establishment, we put in place safeguarding measures and have NDA approved staff volunteers. It is managed by a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths) Ambassador, Jason Williams who has a knack of explaining our space world in easy to understand ways for any age visitor, treating young people as individuals. No 'talking-down'. Deb Stevens is a local science advisory teacher so used to working safely with children and people with accessibility and learning issues – everyone is on a space discovery learning curve!

EAARO is located in a former cold war bunker, complete with blast doors and gun ports. Well worth a visit, and great to see old buildings revitalised!

## **Update from Alconbury Weald**

It has been a busy time up at Alconbury Weald, with both housebuilders, residents and businesses adapting to the changing Coronavirus guidance. While many of the events planned over the summer had to be cancelled, we were pleased to hold the Summer Saturdays "pop-up" events on Watch Office Green.

The rollout of the development continues with Hopkins Homes soon to launch their second parcel of homes within the development, and families moving into homes from Redrow, Morris, Crest Nicholson and Civic Living each week. We currently have just over 350 families and a growing school community at Ermine Street Church Academy.


